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Background

The Addiction Leadership Days are held annually in three locations: Te Whanganui-a-Tara | Wellington (March), Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland (July), and Ōtautahi | Christchurch (November). Organised by the National Committee of Addiction Treatment (NCAT) and supported by Te Pou, these events serve as a crucial platform for sector leaders and decision-makers. These one-day events provide an opportunity to deepen professional networks, share sector updates and research, and strengthen and develop leadership.

This report, prepared by Te Pou, summarises feedback from the leadership day held in Te Whanganui-a-Tara | Wellington on 27 March 2025. The theme of the day was **Me whakahangaia e tātou**, **he ao mo āpōpō | Shaping tomorrow**, **together**. The evaluation, based on post-event survey responses, aims to inform and guide the planning of future Addiction Leadership Day events.

Methods

Attendees were invited to provide feedback via an online survey through SurveyMonkey at the end of the event. Out of 114 participants, 51 individuals (45 percent) responded to the survey. This response rate provides a moderate degree of confidence that the responses accurately reflect the views of most attendees. The survey included both closed and openended questions. Quantitative data from the survey was analysed using Excel, while qualitative data was analysed using MAXQDA software.

Results

Socio-demographics

Respondent's role

The respondents held a variety of leadership roles. Managers made up the largest group at 41 percent, followed by senior practitioners at 22 percent, team leaders at 11 percent, and those in consumer, peer support, or lived experience roles at 9 percent. Some respondents reported 'other' roles, including roles such as president of a professional body, sector engagement lead, policy analyst, consumer advisor, project lead, and district lead. 


Figure 1. Respondent's role (35 respondents)

Ethnicity

The respondents were largely New Zealand European/Pākehā (74 percent), followed by Māori (15 percent) and Pasifika peoples (13 percent). Four percent identified as Indian, and two percent as Asian. Other ethnicities, including Australian Aboriginal and British, made-up seven percent, as shown in Figure 3.





Figure 2. Ethnic Composition of Respondents (multiple choice option, 46 respondents)

Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora district

Attendees were asked to indicate the Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora district they work in, with the option to select multiple districts. Since the event was held Te Whanganui-a-Tara, the largest percentage of people were from Capital, Coast, and Hutt Valley (30 percent); 29 percent of respondents worked nationally. 
Figure 3. Distribution of respondents across Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora districts (multiple choice option, 46 respondents)



Level of knowledge about the latest significant sector changes


Figure 4. Respondents rating their level of knowledge as 'good' or 'very good' before and after the event (51 respondents)

Before the event, 35 percent of respondents rated their knowledge of the latest significant sector changes as good or very good, while 49 percent were neutral. After the event, 90 percent rated their knowledge as good or very good. See Figure 4.

Value of the day

Most respondents (90 percent) rated the event as good or very good in value. A majority (84 percent) found the event highly relevant to their addiction work, and 82 percent appreciated the professional networking opportunities. Collaboration with other participants at strategic levels was rated positively by 67 percent, while 69 percent rated service-level collaboration positively. 
Figure 5. Distribution of respondents rating the event statements (51 participants)



Most useful part of the event

Participants were asked to rate the most useful parts of the day (see agenda in Appendix A), with the option to select multiple choices. 'Recovery for Everyone' by SMART Recovery Australia was highly rated by 73 percent of respondents, followed by the update from dapaanz (58 percent) and the Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora Central region update (54 percent). A few respondents (4 percent) selected "others" and mentioned that the entire day was generally useful. New initiatives, including harm reduction, the update from dapaanz, and regional updates, were some of the topics recommended at the last leadership day held in Ōtautahi, and the appreciation for these topics is reflected in the figure below. Using the information from the event in their mahi

Most respondents (91 percent) expressed their intent to use the information from the event in their mahi. When asked how they plan to use the information, 48 respondents provided open-text comments. From these responses, four key themes emerged (refer to Figure 7 for details on the use of information).

Sharing Information

- Many participants mentioned they would share the information with colleagues, team members, and networks to keep everyone informed and connected with current challenges and achievements.
- Some participants mentioned they would discuss the information in board meetings, team discussions, and with managers to ensure the insights are integrated into their organisational strategies.

Networking

• Networking with key stakeholders and leaders was highlighted as a crucial part of the day, with several respondents emphasising their intention to build and maintain these connections.

Practical Application

• Respondents indicated plans to embed the knowledge into their practice, inform service development, and use the information to set strategic directions and inform planning.

Utilising Resources

• There was a focus on utilising specific resources, such as SMART Recovery strategies and family violence competencies, to enhance their work.



Key take-home messages

Attendees were asked to share their top three take-home messages from the event. The responses highlighted themes that align with the ratings for the most useful parts of the event. Key takeaways included the value of the SMART Recovery approach, the importance of communication and collaboration within the sector, and updates from the government and sector. Comments are summarised under five key themes and Figure 8 shows the word cloud of the comments made by the respondents.

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SMART Recovery

The SMART Recovery approach was a recurring theme, with many respondents finding it valuable and planning to incorporate it into their work. Comments included:

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"SMART was amazing."

"More knowledge about SMART recovery groups."

"SMART recovery will be useful."
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Communication and collaboration

The comments highlighted the recurring theme of fostering connections and working collaboratively to address challenges within the sector. Some comments were:

"The importance of communication, collaboration, and relationship."

"Importance of connection with the sector."

"Networking is valuable."

Government and sector updates

Key takeaways for some attendees were updates from the sector and government. Comments included:

"Government plan to increase funding to addiction sector."

"Workforce Development Council changes and how these might affect qualifications available to the emerging workforce."

"Te Ara Poutama treatment reviews."

"Lived experience revolution"

Mental health and addiction pressures

Respondents' comments reflected the recognition of the challenges faced by the sector, including funding and resource challenges. Comments included:

"There are many pressures in the Mental Health and Addiction space."

"The sector is under significant pressure with austerity."

"Funding instability."

"Challenges with Funding and impact on Services."

New actions

Some respondents shared their key takeaways regarding new initiatives and services. Comments included:

"Crisis cafes are coming."

"New better matched treatment coming to corrections."

"Introduction of new initiatives and services, such as crisis cafes and better treatment options."

"Local areas can use their data to identify strategic direction."

"The good news for those incarcerated on remand: services will be commissioned to support timely support, and DAPAANZ will be supporting accreditation for corrections workforce."

Recommendations for future topics

Respondents made diverse range of recommendations for the next potential topics for the next Addiction Leadership Day ranging from technological advancements and policy updates to specific population needs and treatment approaches. The recommendations are summarised in Figure 9.

Overall comments

Seventeen attendees shared their overall experience of the event. Participants appreciated the opportunity to network and reconnect with colleagues, found the presentations informative, and praised the overall organisation of the day. However, some feedback indicated that regional updates were not relevant to all attendees. One respondent noted, "Having now sat through two different sessions of regional updates from Te Whatu Ora, these are probably interesting if you're in the region, but not really relevant if not - and given that there's no coordination, even less so." Additionally, there were concerns about presentations on violence, which were seen as critical but not fully engaging. Overall, the event was well-received, with suggestions for more networking opportunities. One attendee summed it up: "Awesome day, awesome people, awesome kai, and awesome korero."

Conclusion

The Addiction Leadership Day held in March 2025 in Te Whanganui-a-Tara was a key event for sector leaders and decision-makers. It provided an excellent platform for networking, sharing sector updates, and discussing new initiatives. Participants appreciated the

informative presentations and the opportunity to connect with colleagues. While the ratings for collaboration at both strategic and service levels were comparatively lower than other ratings and consistent with past events, this highlights an opportunity to further enhance these aspects in future events. Strengthening collaboration could lead to even more impactful outcomes and stronger connections within the sector. Further, the recommended topics made by respondents are encouraged to be considered in the planning of future leadership days. Overall, the event was well-received, with participants expressing satisfaction with the content and organisation
